Call for Entries

All NEHS members are invited to participate in the 2019 Photo Contest. Enter one or all six categories – six chances to win! The lucky winner in each category will win a prize and their photo will be featured in the 2020 NEHS Calendar. Simply bring your photos to the February 3 NEHS meeting to enter.

CONTEST RULES: Photos taken in any garden during 2018 are eligible. You do not need to be a professional photographer to enter and no special camera was required - digital or film, flash & no flash.

- There are 6 photo categories to enter and you can enter as many categories as you like.
- Only one photo per category.
- Your pictures must be printed on photographic paper, 4x6" or 5x7" format only.
- No framing or matting allowed. Photos must stand on their own merit without embellishment.
- All photos submitted must be labeled on the back with category number, hosta or plant name, and member name & address, for example: #3 Strip Tease, Jane Doe, 130 Main St, Franklin, MA,
- Winning photos will be selected by the NEHS members in attendance at the meeting.

HOSTA PHOTO CONTEST CATEGORIES

#1 BEST HOSTA INDIVIDUAL LEAF

A photo focused on one outstanding leaf, showing details like veining, ruffling, texture, etc.

#2 BEST VARIEGATED HOSTA

Photos of variegated hosta, either single subject or mass planting of one plant.

#3 BEST NON-VARIEGATED HOSTA

Photos of any solid color hosta (greens, blue or yellow), single plant or mass planting.

#4 BEST HOSTA AND COMPANION PLANT GROUPING

Photo of a single or group of hosta with companion plants growing in harmony.

#5 BEST HOSTA GARDEN LANDSCAPE

Photo should feature hosta growing in a landscape setting. This may be a mass planting of the same hosta, groupings of different varieties or hosta growing alongside other companion plants.

#6 BEST CREATIVE HOSTA PHOTO

Photos could include hosta clump emerging in spring, uniquely colored petioles, fascinated flower scapes, unusual streaking or a sport that is developing from the mother plant, or any other hosta oddity.
